As the Castlemore Homes development in Oak Tree View, Levington Lane, is almost complete, we welcome a number of new residents to the village. Hopefully you will all have received your 'Welcome to Bucklesham' postcard with details of the village website. There is a lot of information on the website about all things Bucklesham, including a helpful page for new residents. The Parish

Council hopes you will all be very happy in your new homes. The village is in full bloom at the moment with all the daffodil bulbs that were planted in the autumn. We may be offered more bulbs each year so if you helped out and would like some more, if your property has a kerbside boundary, if there is a suitable verge near your home, or if you are willing to plant them around the roadside signs, please get in touch and we will deliver a bag to you this coming Autumn.

You will hopefully have noticed many projects around the village that have been paid for using the Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL), which was paid to the Parish Council from the Castlemore Home development. There are still a lot of CIL funds available so if you have any ideas for projects that would fit the criteria, please do let us know as we are open to all suggestions. CIL must be spent on village infrastructure such as the Playing Field, the Village Hall and the School, and also road signs, highways improvements, and street furniture like benches and notice boards. The Budget was discussed at length at the Parish Council meeting in January and it was decided that, to ensure we could cover all costs involved in managing the village on behalf of all residents, it was necessary to raise the precept this year. We are very mindful that we have a huge responsibility to ensure villagers get value for their money, and therefore a great deal of time goes into carefully planning for any expenditure. The cost of all services such as grass cutting, playing field maintenance, and insurance has increased dramatically this year and this has had a knock-on effect on our budgeting. When deciding the Budget we were acutely aware of the pressures of the cost of living for so many villagers. The rise for an average household in Bucklesham will be 13p per week.

#### **Bucklesham Allotments, Green Crescent**

#### **Bucklesham Neighbourhood Plan**

The Parish Council has been continually encouraged by East Suffolk Council to implement a Neighbourhood Plan (NP). The Suffolk Association of Local Councils (SALC) and East Suffolk Council advise that NPs should be community lead (volunteers from the village) rather than merely compiled by the Parish Council. This is a lengthy and arduous process but Parish Councillors can be part of the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group and would support residents who wished to take the role on.

If the village wishes to consider developing a Neighbourhood Plan there will be many things to think about:

- Firstly, there needs to be an identification of exactly what the village want in the NP. It is not merely about future planning. It can be about improved infrastructure, protection of environment, village status etc.
- The need would have to be identified with proof of in-depth consultation of all villagers, all village groups, and all neighbouring parishes by way of surveys, exhibitions, open meetings and forums etc.
- All views would have to be collated and presented in an open exhibition for all to see.
- Policies would then need to be drawn up.
- There then would be the District Council Inspection, verification process and any necessary alterations.
- The NP would then be published, and again a lengthy consultation (requiring evidence of such consultation) of all villagers, all village groups, and all neighbouring parishes.
- A referendum would then be organised for all villagers to have their say on the plan. It needs to be agreed upon by at least 50% of the voting population.

The NP would then be adopted by the District Council, which means they will commit to 'take it into consideration' when deciding upon planning. The process usually takes 2-3 years and the plan will need to be updated every 5 years. It is advisable use a Consultant to manage the project and there may be a grant from Locality (i.e. the Government) to pay for this.

The heroism of those who landed on the shores of the Normandy beaches will be remembered by lighting a Memorial Beacon on the Playing Field on D-Day, in tribute to all those involved, including those who unfortunately did not return. This initiative will be taking place nationwide and we are thrilled that Bucklesham is able to join

in thanks to the generosity of Castlemore Homes and their contractors, who have covered the cost of the materials for the Memorial Beacon. This has then very kindly been crafted by Bucklesham Resident Mick Jackson, who has given his time and expertise for free.

There were 156,000 allied troops that landed in Normandy on D-Day. The National Federation of Fish Fryers is aiming to sell 156,000 portions of Fish and Chips, with £1 from each portion going to The Royal Navy and Merchant Navy Associations, Royal Air Force Benevolent Fund, and ABF The Soldiers Charity. The Shannon are joining in with this initiative so you can all have a fish and chip supper before the lighting of the beacon.
